## POLICE DEPARTMENT UPDATE

As we look forward to another new year here at the Allegheny Township Police Department, let's take a brief look back at our accomplishments and recent events.

In the spring of 2018, we moved into the new municipal building addition. Over the past few years, we have obtained the following for the police department: four new cruisers utilizing the Local Shares Account grant money, four ballistic shields— two purchased by the township and two at no cost, two sets of entry tool kits at no cost to the township, two AEDs utilizing grant money, NARCAN, body-worn cameras and in-car cameras, along with new handguns. Replacing outdated and used equipment, while costly, is essential not only for the safety of our officers but the public as well. To help keep costs down, we are constantly seeking and applying for any applicable grant programs. These successful grant applications have saved the Township hundreds of thousands of dollars which in turn helps save residents and businesses tax dollars.

We created a Field Training Officer program, and officers are attending more trainings to better serve and protect the community. The department also continues to attend various community-oriented events. Out of necessity to better serve, we have added an additional patrol officer position. It was found there was also a need for the position of detective. This position was created to allow for the individual assigned to concentrate on investigating the more complex cases and permit the patrol officers to effectively patrol the Township.

Lastly, it is always a goal here at the police department to provide quality service and protection to the Township businesses, residents, and guests. Working hand-in-hand seamlessly with the Township Supervisors helps to enable the Department to achieve this goal on a daily basis.

### **SEWER AUTHORITY NEWS**

The Allegheny Township Water & Sewer Authority has been serving the Township since 1964. Our fivemember board is comprised of Township residents willing to volunteer their time to oversee the operations and administration of the Authority. Currently serving on the Board are William Bryan, Jr. (Chairman), Brock Bryan (Vice-Chairman), Glenn W. Keiper (Secretary), Joseph Shoemaker (Treasurer), Christopher Garman (Asst. Secretary/Treasurer). Due to the Board's diligence with spending, sewer rates have not increased since 2013 at which time the rate increased from \$32.00 per EDU to \$35.00. There are no increases anticipated in the near future. The day-to-day activities are addressed by Tim Campolong, Sewer Inspector and Lisa George, Sewer Office Secretary as well as former sewer inspector Fred Baker. Tim performs inspections, site visits and investigations as needed for new construction and lines already in place.

Fred Baker served as sewer inspector for 28 years until his retirement in 2024 at which time he offered his services as needed/on call. Lisa receives sewer payments daily and generates the monthly billings for residents' sewer accounts as well as processing the Authority's monthly expenses, aiding in the annual audit and handling other tasks as they arise. As a reminder, sewer authority customers are now able to receive their bills via email. Just contact Lisa with your email address.
